### WEST MICHIGAN WMF MINERAL STUDY GROUP UPDATE (FLUORITE)

We had some new and old faces for the November meeting to study Fluorite.

Fluorite got its name from the Latin, fluere = "to flow", because it was used as a flux in melting metals. The term fluorescence is derived from fluorite, which will often exhibit this effect. The element fluorine also derives its name from fluorite, which is a major source for the element.

Fluorite is commonly formed in hydrothermal events associated with calcite, galena, albite, spinel, baryte, chalcedony, pyrite, and sphalerite. It also appears in limestone vugs, and in granite. It can be found in about a dozen counties in Michigan.

Fluorite comes in at least ten colors, from clear, white, blue, violet, green, pink, brown, yellow, and black. We had specimens of ten different colors to hold at our meeting. We had specimens with phantom color layers. We had specimens with pyrite and sphalerite inclusions.

### HARDEST SUBSTANCE EVER MADE BY MAN

Via Cedar Valley Gems 11/09 via The Rockpile 12/09

General Electric scientists announced {*Editor's Note: checking the facts, I found that this was in 1957!*} the hardest substance ever made by man or nature, an entirely new material. It is crystal hard enough to scratch a diamond and able to withstand twice as much heat. Named Borazon, it is expected to have far reaching impact in industrial polishing and cutting operations. The inventor, Dr. Wentoz, started with boron nitride, commonly called white graphite and is very similar in appearance and feel to talcum powder. Using pressures of about 1,000,000 pounds per square inch and temperatures of over 3,000 F, he changed the crystal from hexagonal to cubic, like diamond. While a diamond burns at 1,600 degrees F., Borazon can withstand temperatures up to 3,500 F.

Via the Breccia 11/08, The Tektite 04/04, San Diego Lapidary Society 09/03 and the Rock Bag

Transparent stones should be polished on both the front and back. Otherwise, saw marks can show through and appear to be cracks.

Most common minerals are identified by sight and holding them in the hand. If you have held 25 specimens of Fluorite you are pretty likely to identify a 26th when it is handed to you for identification. We are learning from each other by sharing specimens, and a little research we each do before the meeting.

Fluorite normally forms in a cubic habit. Most common octahedrons are cleaved. The cleavage is useful for identification. Fluorite will form an

octahedron habit if deposited at high temperatures, but there are few localities where this is common.

BTW, fluorine promotes hard tooth enamel in low concentrations, reducing tooth decay. Grand Rapids was the first city to fluoridate its water.

Luster is vitreous. Penetration twins are common. There are some unusual associations like silver. Hardness is 4. Some Fluorite is thermo luminescent.

We are skipping December because it is just too busy. If other members are not willing to host meetings I will be moving to an every other month format (it is an odd numbered month, time to do something odd and go to a mineral study group meeting) for 2010.



The next West Michigan WMF Mineral Study Group will meet on the second Tuesday, January 12, 2010, from 7 to 9 pm, at my home, 653 Burton St. S.E., Grand Rapids, MI 49507. The mineral to be studied is Quartz (and its varieties). The meeting will start and end on time (please do not arrive more than 20 minutes early). Each member will be expected to bring some research on the topic mineral, and, hopefully, at least

one specimen, to share with the group. We hope you can join us for this growing opportunity. Kreigh
