Another Field Trip to the Alabastine Gypsum Mine

(Michigan Natural Storage Co.) 1200 Judd S.W., Grand Rapids, MI Saturday, October 2, 2010, 10:00 am to 4:00 pm Saturday, November 13, 2010, 10:00 am to 4:00 pm

Please read the whole notice before responding.

Because not everyone can make the Oct 2 trip, I have made arrangements with Professor Kevin Cole at GVSU to make a second collecting trip on Nov 13 into the former Alabastine Mine that is now owned by Grand Rapids Natural Storage. This is expected to be our last trip this year. There are still a few openings for the Oct 2 trip; you may sign up for both trips. Please mention the date you wish to reserve in your request. Ground rules for both trips are the same.

There is a wide variety of specimens to be collected. 'Pencil' selenite and alabaster gypsum are abundant, both white and honey colored. You may find clear selenite or satin spar gypsum. Fossil collectors may find shark coprolites, teeth, or spines, and plant and wood fragments, near and in the shale ceiling. Mineral collectors may enjoy seeing epsomite hairs hanging from the ceilings, but should only collect those that have fallen or are growing on rubble on the floor.



Safety: Everyone must sign in when entering the mine. Everyone must sign out when leaving the mine. No exceptions. The safety list will be in the mine next to the elevator. I don't want to spend hours searching six miles of tunnels for some idiot who failed to sign out (you, won't be invited back). I will accept no excuses for failing to follow this basic safety procedure. Safety is not optional underground. Please do not collect alone.

Cost: There is a \$2.00 fee per person for entering the mine. You may pay in advance, or when you arrive. You will not be allowed entry if you have not paid the fee. If paying by check, please make it out to Grand Valley State University.

Equipment: Hard hats are required. If you have extra hard hats, please bring them along (we usually have a few that do not have a hard hat, or forget theirs). Safety glasses are not required, but are always a good idea.

You must have at least two light sources. The mine tunnels we will be collecting in are not lighted. Make sure you start with new batteries, and have extras in your pocket. It is not possible to have too much light when you are 85 feet underground.

You must bring two pairs of shoes. One pair will be worn for travel in and out of the clean part of the mine that has cement floors. The second pair will be worn in the very muddy part of the mine where collecting will take place. It is strongly recommended that your second pair be boots for collecting in the drifts. It is very important to the mine owners that the finished parts of the mine remain clean because of the foods they store. We want to be able to return again, so this is an absolute requirement (unless you want to walk out barefoot, not recommended).

The mine is a constant 50-52 degrees. It is very muddy. Clearance in many tunnels is 4 feet so you will do some crawling. Please dress for the conditions. Expect to get very dirty. Gypsum/shale mud is very sticky.

Tools: Rock pick, 2-5 lb sledge, chisels. Make sure you have a bucket or collecting bag to carry out specimens. You may want some wrapping material (newspaper) for protecting your best specimens. You may want to consider a pry bar. Travel light.

Food: Mining is hard work. Bring a sack lunch and snacks. Everything you bring into the mine must be carried out. There are rest room facilities on the surface. Don't forget water.

Elevator: If you use the elevator you must leave the doors closed so it can be recalled from the surface or the mine. None of us want to be forced to use the stairs.

Insurance: You must be an AFMS related club member to attend the trip. Identify your club on your reservation request.

Directions: 131 to Burton Street West. Right on Clyde Park Left on Chicago Drive, Right on Judd. 196 to Chicago Drive (exit 72), Right to Burlingame, then Left onto Chicago Drive, Left on Marquette, Left on Judd. Back parking lot on the right. Please try to arrive at least 15 minutes early to sign in and pay your fee and sign in. Use Google Maps or MapQuest if you have doubts about the directions. Everyone must arrive ontime, but you may leave any time you have finished collecting.

Do not hesitate to ask questions. Contact (IMRMC) is Kreigh Tomaszewski at 616-243-5851 (home) or 616-787-7955 (work), or Kreigh@Tomaszewski.net (email). Email is preferred. Requests will be first-come, first-served

The mine has restricted access for this date. The first 45 people who confirm reservations with me will be able to attend this trip. Children are welcome, but we ask that they be at least 8 years old. Please let me know as soon as possible if you are unable to keep your reservation.

I will keep a waiting list; please include your phone number with your (emailed) request so I can contact you at the last minute if someone drops out, or if there are last minute changes. People on the waiting list from the last trip always have the first opportunity to sign up for the next trip (if they provide an email address).

HOW THE AUCTION WORKS, AND HOW TO BUY STUFF

On Tuesday, October 21st, the Indian Mounds Club regular monthly meeting will be replaced by our annual Silent Auction Sale, with the opportunity to buy and sell a wide variety of Rockhound items throughout the evening. Please note that the Auction runs continuously from 7:00 pm to 9:00 pm. The Auction will be held in our usual meeting room in the Wesley Park United Methodist Church basement. Sixteen sales tables filled with hundreds of bargain-priced hobby items will be open simultaneously for written bids on individual items. As each sales table is periodically sold (closed) and emptied every few minutes, it will be then be re-stocked with even more new rock goodies, all evening long. Generally five or six hundred rock and mineral hobby items are offered for sale that evening. And at bargain prices you just won't believe! There is definitely SOMETHING there with YOUR name on it!

In this section, we look at how our Silent Auction works (for you first-timers), review some buying tips, and ask for your volunteer help.

So... you want to improve your personal collection, but gas prices and time constraints limit your field trips, and most gravel pits and quarries are no longer open to collecting. You wince at the specimen prices online or at mineral shows, and many rock shops have now simply vanished. You still hope for some amazing bargains on beginner specimens, exotic crystals, fossils, slabs, lapidary rough, loose gems, finished jewelry, findings, beadwork, lapidary equipment & supplies, cabs, tumbler rough, collecting tools, books, magazines, and anything else hobby-related. Well, here comes your opportunity!

Here's how easy it is to buy items at the Silent Auction:

- 1. Anyone may bid on any unsold item on any open Sales Table. You don't have to pre-register or be a club member in order to bid on items. (Note: These are written bids, not "shout out" bids.) This Sale is open to the public, and will be advertised locally.
- 2. Every item for sale has a <u>Bid Slip</u> with it. Each Bid Slip lists the item description, seller name, and the Minimum Bid amount. The <u>Minimum Bid</u> is the lowest amount that you may start your bidding at.
- 3. To place a bid, simply print your name and your bid amount legibly on the next open bid line on the Bid Slip, while a table is still open for bids. Like any auction, this is a binding bid. If you bid, then you are agreeing to purchase that item for that price.
- 4. If someone's name is already on the Bid Slip, and the table is still open, then <u>you may overbid</u> them by printing your name and a higher bid amount, on the next line. Your bid raise must be at least 25 cents higher than the previous bid, unless otherwise noted by the Seller. On the Special Items Table, the bid raise is at least \$1.00.



- 5. Bidding rules are clearly posted at each Sales Table. When a table is "Sold" (closed), then you may no longer bid on an item. The highest written amount wins the item. If the table closes while you are writing your bid, then your bid counts. Any bidding disputes are settled immediately by the Auction Chairman.
- 6. When a table is Sold (closed), and if yours is the winning bid, you then pick up your item(s) and their Bid Slip(s) and take them directly and immediately to the Cashier Table for immediate payment.
- 7. Pay for your items right away at the Cashier Table. Payment is generally "Cash Only", unless approved by the Club Treasurer. All sales are final. You are responsible for safe-keeping your own paid-for items.
- 8. Any item which is left unclaimed after a table re-opens is then again available for anyone to bid on and buy.
- 9. The Indian Mounds Club is not responsible for any lost, stolen, or damaged items. There will be some club members there assigned to surveillance and general security, but please mind your valuables.

Here are some buying (and courtesy) tips to improve your Silent Auction experience: Get there at the beginning of the Auction (7:00 pm) to get in on the early bidding. If you see something interesting, put a reasonable bid on it right away; otherwise, if you wait, that table may be sold before you return to it. If you see a youngster bidding on an item, consider giving them a chance to win it. Please don't "hover" over an item; you might just miss out on some other nice stuff. Bring along an empty box (with your name on it) and some tissue to wrap and protect your winnings. Stick around until the very end of the Auction (9:00 pm) for some great discounts, deals, and "clearance" prices. And have some fun!

The Silent Auction is open to everyone, not just members, so invite your friends and neighbors. The Auction will be advertised in the newspaper and online. Also, please bring some items to sell. Don't forget to bring some extra cash and maybe your checkbook, in case you spot that special deal.

THE CLUB STILL NEEDS YOUR HELP! Auction volunteers are still needed, especially for the Set-Up Team. Extra workers are always welcome. Whether for the entire evening or just a half-hour, your help is greatly appreciated. If you can help, just give me a call (530-9571), and I'll find a volunteer spot for you. Also, don't forget to bring some extra plastic bags (grocery size and smaller) for our Cashiers to use for bagging, plus some snacks and beverages for our Refreshment Sales Table to sell.

PART 2: WE NEED <u>YOU</u> TO SELL ITEMS!

This section focuses on **how to sell your stuff** at our Auction. We really do need **you** to bring items to sell that evening.

Do you have some extra specimens from collecting sites that are now closed? Maybe your garage or basement holds buckets of decent rocks that will never again see the light of day? Could one of your spare "dust collectors" become a prized specimen for a beginning collector? Wouldn't you rather earn a few bucks from your unused lapidary equipment than to have it just end up in the scrap yard someday? I thought so! Whether a collecting veteran with museum quality material, or someone who just wants to make a little room on their collection shelf or workbench, you can make a few extra dollars by bringing your rock-related items to sell at our Auction Sale.



After receiving some helpful suggestions from last year's auction, we've again tweaked the rules a bit in order to improve the sale by getting a better distribution of material from all Sellers out onto the tables, and keeping the Sale moving. As always, your constructive suggestions are welcomed!

Listed below are the basics of How to Sell at the Indian Mounds Silent Auction:

- 1. Anyone may sell items in the Silent Auction, including Club members, visitors, or someone who just found Grandpa's old rock hammers in the attic. Items should be hobby-related, or else approved by the Auction Chairman or Club President. All non-member Sellers must pay the minimum \$10 Club membership fee in order to sell their items. If not pre-paid, then the \$10 fee will be automatically deducted from the sales commission check by the Club Treasurer.
- 2. <u>Commission Fee:</u> 20% of your total sales automatically go to the Indian Mounds Rock & Mineral Club, and all sales money will be collected at the Auction by the Cashiers and Club Treasurer.
- 3. <u>Payment</u> to you for your sold items will be calculated by the Club Treasurer the week after the Auction, minus the 20% commission and any fees, and then a check will be mailed to you afterwards.
- 4. Indian Mounds Club members do not have to pre-register to sell items in the Silent Auction. Just show up with your items! Any non-members selling items must register at the Auction with the Club Treasurer, and leave your name, address, and phone number, if you want to receive payment.
- 5. Every item for sale must have an <u>approved Bid Slip</u> with it. Only the current version of the Bid Slip may be used. We cannot guarantee payment to you if an older version is used.
- 6. <u>Blank Bid Slips</u> are available online to print from the Club's website at: <u>www.indianmoundsrockclub.com.</u> Bid Slips will also be available at the Auction.
- 7. Valid Bid Slips must have an item description, plus a minimum bid price, and the Seller's name filled in. If an item's Bid Slip does not have a legible Seller name, it is considered to be 100% donated to the Club.
- 8. IMPORTANT: Unless you are part of the official Set-Up Crew, please don't come before 6:30 pm. Between 6:30 and 6:45 pm ONLY, Sellers may place only one (1) item per table along with its Bid Slip directly onto the Sales tables, if there is sufficient space. All other sale items, along with completed Bid Slips, must be dropped off in the Sale Staging Area for placement by Auction workers. This policy allows Sellers an opportunity to get their highest priority items onto the sales tables.



- 9. ONLY authorized auction workers are allowed to stay in the Sale Staging Area and to re-stock sales tables. Sellers are not allowed to move their own items onto sales tables during the Auction. We are trying to be fair to everyone who brings material to sell.
- 10. <u>Security:</u> Although the Club does take some security measures during the sale, if you have an item of special security concern (for example, a small faceted gem), you are urged to keep an eye on your own such items, or to make special arrangements with the Auction Chairman.
- 11. Sellers, please take your unsold items home with you immediately after the Auction. We will try to save any unsold material, but we cannot guarantee that it will not get lost, damaged, or donated. Any leftover items are considered abandoned, and may become property of the Club, for disposal.
- 12. Any bidding or selling disputes are settled immediately by the Auction Chairman.

Here are a few selling tips for improving your chances of a successful sale: Give your sales items a good cleaning or dusting, so that they look their best. For slabs and lapidary rough, rubbing with a bit of mineral oil really brings out the colors. Fill out your Bid Slips at home, so that you don't miss out on precious sales time during the Auction. Having a detailed item description, including its source, greatly increases its value. Price your items reasonably; a low starting price often sparks interest and competitive bidding, resulting in a higher sale price. Get to the Auction early to get your items quickly ready to sell. Volunteer to help out wherever needed, because more help means a smoother Auction -- and happy bidders! Happy bidders mean happy Sellers!

<u>Yes, you can be a successful Seller.</u> Tidy up your collection or workshop, sell off some unneeded hobby items, and make some easy cash in the process. It's that simple! The Silent Auction Sale will be advertised locally and online; so, with gobs of buyers coming, all we need are your items to sell.

NOTE TO SELLERS: Sellers will not be allowed to linger in the Sales Staging Area. If your Bid Slips are not completed ahead of time, you will have to fill them out in the Kitchen Area across the hall. Also, there will be a Special Items Sale Table available for items with a Minimum Bid of at least \$25. A copy of a blank Bid Slip is available at www.indianmoundsrockclub.com.

The West Michigan MWF Mineral Study Group started its second year by meeting on the second Tuesday of September to study the Mica Group of minerals. The word "mica" is thought to be derived from the Latin word *micare*, meaning "to glitter". The Mica Group contains 44 different phyllosilicate minerals that share a similar chemical formula and nearly perfect basal cleavage. All are monoclinic and tend to have pseudohexagonal crystals.

The four common mica members are Muscovite (white), Biotite (black), Lepidolite (purple), and Fuchsite (green). Laboratory analysis is usually required for positive identification of specific mica minerals within the group. The group had ten different mica minerals for hand study. You learn hand identification by studying a variety of known specimens, which is why we ask everyone attending to try to bring one or more specimens of the mineral of the month to our meeting



Large mica crystals are typically found in granite pegmatites. The largest mica crystal ever found came from Ontario and weighed 330 tons. Mica is found throughout the world.

Mica's are used in electronics to make capacitors and insulators. Mica's also have excellent thermal properties and are used to hold resistance wires in toasters, and as windows into boilers and furnaces. Mica in the form of isinglass was used in lanterns, windows in horse drawn carriages, and in early automobiles.

Mica is used in the optics industry. It is a component of many brands of toothpaste. It is used in the paint and printing industries to make pigments and reflective finishes, and it is used in cosmetics to make the skin 'glow'.

Mica also finds use in making building insulation, improving the quality of axel greases, and in making potting soils. The extremely flat faces of mica crystals are used in making atomic force microscopes and other scientific devices that require ultra-flat surfaces.

The next West Michigan MWF Mineral Study Group will meet from 7 to 9 pm on October 12, 2010, at the home of Bryan Brewer, 1148 60th St. S.E., Kentwood, MI 49508. We will be studying the Garnet Group of minerals. We like to start (and end) on time, but please do not arrive more than 20 minutes early. All West Michigan Rockhound are invited to attend. Please look up a few facts about the topic mineral, and hopefully bring along at least one specimen to let others look at (the more, the merrier). We hope you can join us for this growing opportunity.


